Thus, our pastor, the Reverend G. Harr, delivered the homily at her Resurrection Mass with a rose in his hand as a symbol of Sister's soul which had attained full bloom.

Sister Gertrudis was laid to rest on June 11, in Calvary Cemetery where she awaits her resurrection together with 70 of our Sisters who are buried there.

Though Sister is no longer with us, we are sure that we shall feel her intercession for us, and that God will continue to bless our work here in Alliance.
