COVID-19

An update regarding The Sisters of St. Francis of Penance and Christian Charity

At the writing of this sharing, there have been 1,846,680 persons infected world-wide with the Corona virus with some 114,090 deaths. Every continent has individuals who have been infected...and many countries have taken dramatic measures to combat its spread.

So that we might be able to share in the plight of our sisters (and our world), and join together in this difficult time we asked these questions:

St. Francis Province, Redwood City, USA

In this time of social distancing, quarantine and isolation, our Sisters and Associates in St.Francis Province, West Coast of US and also Southern Mexico are still well. It is hard to know who is infected with COVID19 and who is not since testing is not widely available. So the precautions that are in place everywhere are the main way of preventing, or diminishing the spread of the virus.

There is so much to tell about the responses of Sisters and Associates throughout the province. Here are just few highlights. From home, some are making sandwiches or hot meals to be distributed to homeless persons. They are shopping for Sisters and others who cannot be outside because they are vulnerable and at risk of infection. Others are making and distributing masks.

Associates in Los Angeles who are teaching from home, or working in a very large family social service agency are finding creative ways to connect with the people they serve. Parenting classes, counseling, schooling, staff meetings, are all continuing via zoom. Food distribution also is increased with the needs. Our Sisters and Associates who are medical workers — a doctor, a physician assistant, and a few nurses — still see patients and respond to emergencies. While tired, sometimes exhausted, until now they are still healthy. Homeless, poor and homebound people are a priority.

Senior Sisters are living at Marian Convent in Santa Maria and at five different senior residences in other parts of the province. All are well and are following the strict social distancing precautions mandate by the Sates and local governments. Most have the possibility to participate in the Eucharist through the Internet, connecting to their parishes, or a catholic television channel, or to the Vatican live streaming. Sisters in Santa Maria are supporting the work of our partners in the hospital and clinics. The Home Health staff who share the convent building with the Sisters are finding many of their at home patients who are not able to shop for food, or cannot afford the healthy food they need. The Sisters donated their lenten savings to Home health to help meet this need.

In Chiapas, one of the Sisters, a nurse, is working in a distant village health center, where there is no access to telephone or internet. There is no testing available, still the Doctor and our Sister know that the virus is present in the area. They have asked that only emergencies come to the clinic, and are treating wounds, injuries from car accidents and so on. For other situations they and the Sisters in Palenque are distributing medicine. Our Sister is staying out in this village to avoid spreading the virus among the Sisters and others at home in Palenque. A sign of hope to people is the construction work going on to prepare for installation of units for the St. Claire Family Clinic which will soon be able to offer access to medical care. This has been a dream of the community for years.

More and more of us are noticing that with the stay at home orders, the "social distancing" there is so much connecting growing in society and in our communities was ell. Regional communities are joining together for prayer and community meetings through the internet and phone calls. Associates are doing the same. Our Council meetings are held through Zoom and we find it quite effective.

Many of us are commenting that there is more time for prayer, reading, creating beauty... Like our Sisters and Associate everywhere we are praying in solidarity with those who are suffering the virus, or who have died, for the medical workers, for those who have lost jobs, for people at home alone... This time of immense disruption by COVID19 is also a time of amazing grace and renewal of deeply held values. Perhaps we are experiencing Easter as never before.

In our hospitals there are sufficient intensive and (artificial) respiration resources available. There are still some freedoms so that we are also able to give neighborly help, even across the border.

Prayer for the mitigation of the epidemic and for the fears of many people have a fixed place in our day.

Our most important activity in these days of the pandemic is to pray for everyone who is at the forefront of the virus. Everyone is grateful for this: here is a note from a doctor who works in palliative medicine and respiratory care/pulmonology:
